

Factors Affecting the Career Preferences of Freshman College Students of Basilan State College

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Abstract— This study aimed to assess factors that affect the career preferences of selected freshman college students of Basilan State College. One hundred twenty (120) freshman college students of Basilan State College was selected through stratified random sampling. Findings shows that personal and job/occupation factors, affect the career preferences of the respondents. The freshman college students are most affected by personal factors in their career preferences, followed by the job/occupation factors least affect the freshman students in their career preferences. Personal, family, social, and job/occupation factors were affecting the career preferences of the students in the different course, at different extent while economic, and school factors were affecting the career preferences of the student in all course, at the same extents.

Keywords— Basilan State College, Career Preferences, Personal Factors, Family Factors, Social Factors, Economic Factors, Job/occupation factors.

I. INTRODUCTION

A career encompasses a variety of possible patterns of personal choice related to each individual's total lifestyle [1]. Lupdag [3] adds it is more than a course or degree. It is a way of life. Career, which is a broad term, differs from vocation which refers to what a worker does. it also differs from occupation, which is a person's regular work as a means of livelihood.

Career preferences are relative to the interaction between the individual and society [4]. It requires an individual to make career decisions within the framework of a social system, which includes the home, family, school, and community.

In addressing the quantitative mismatch between what the industry needs and what Higher Education Institutions (HEIs) produce as graduates, CHED Chairman, Dr. Carlito S. Puno 2006 proposed to 'Conduct Aggressive Career Guidance and Counseling' for graduating high school students, as well as the first and second-year college students.

Career guidance refers to the "utilization of techniques including individual, group counseling and a variety of media for dissemination of occupational information, and modification of existing curriculum to meet student need." It aims "to assist the individuals in career planning and decision-making enables the student to view lifestyle and personal satisfaction and investigate education, works and leisure activities" (FAFE, 1975).

Lupdag [3] declares that career guidance is essential for two reasons. First, through career guidance, the individual potential is developed. Second, the development of human resources leads to national development. The first has personal; the second has collective significance. As recognized by CHED Chairman, Dr. Carlito Puno, the imbalance between manpower needs and the output of the educational system has resulted in unemployment and underemployment.

Gregorio [2] pointed out that, there is a need for education and vocational guidance in our school system because of the significant changes taking place in the home, in labor and industry, in population, and the amount of general education required. Rapid changes in occupation, the introduction of new materials, and changing standards also add to occupational adjustment difficulties.

Practically all leading universities and colleges of the Philippines recognize both the desirability and necessity of guiding students. In the University of the Philippines, orientation courses are provided which are designed to give students correct ideas about the meaning of college education; to acquaint them with the standards and policies of the school, or the guidance aspect; to furnish information regarding different callings, and to make an analysis of the student's capacities. Silliman University, Like UP, offers orientation courses to all freshmen. At Basilan State College (BaSC), freshman college students should be provided with a similar program. Providing information through a similar a program would definitely result to wise career moves by the students towards a successful and fulfilling life. But be able to develop an affective career guidance and counseling program for the college, an empirical set of data on the career preferences of the freshman college students is one of the basic requirements that needs to be determined.

It is based on the premises presented that there is a need to determine the 'Factors Affecting the Career Preferences of Freshman College Student of Basilan State College', and serving as basis, develop an effective, efficient, and relevant college-wide career guidance and counseling program.

This study steered with the following questions:

- What are the factors affecting the career preferences of freshman college student of Basilan State College, in terms of Personal Factors, Family Factors, Social Factors, Economic Factors, School Factors, Job/Occupation Factors?
- 2. To what extent are these factors affecting the career preference of freshman college student of Basilan State College?
- 3. To what extent are these factors affecting the career preferences, of freshman college student of Basilan State College, if classified according to course?

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4. Are there significant differences between the, extent of these factors affecting the career preferences, of freshman college student of Basilan State College Classified according to course?

II. METHODOLOGY

This study used the descriptive research design. The subjects of the study were the one hundred seventy (170) Freshman College Students of Basilan State College. This Study covered the main campus of Basilan State College at Isabela City. The freshman college students were chosen as respondents of the study for being directly affected by any career counseling and guidance program that the college may develop, and consequently adopt, are in a position to best give the most accurate feedback and measure of what factors affected their career preferences. This group would give the most accurate measurement or feedback on the variables considered in the study. A stratified random sampling was adopted in this study as show in table below

A two-part survey questionnaire was used in this study. One part, drew information about socio-demographic profile of the Freshman College Students of Basilan State College, which includes: age, gender, civil status, ethnicity, and course. Part two of the questionnaire determined the factors affecting the career preferences of freshman college student of Basilan State College in terms of: personal factors; Family Factors; Social Factors; Economic Factors; School Factors; and Job/Occupation Factors.

In assessing the extent to which, the factors affect the career preferences of freshman college student, each item had five (5) alternative responses consisting of:

- 1 No extent (N)
- 2 Least Extent (L)
- 3 Moderate Extent (M)
- 4 Great Extent (G)
- 5 Very Great Extent (VG)

In order to interpret the results, the following scale was used:

1.00-1.80 = No extent (N) 1.81 -2.60 = Least Extent (L) 2.61 -3.40 = Moderate Extent (M) 3.41-4.20 = Great Extent (G) 4.21-5.00 = Very Great Extent (VG)

III. PRESENTATION, ANALYSIS, AND DISCUSSION

Profile of the Teacher – Respondents

Shown in Table II is the profile of 120 freshman college student of Basilan State college, who as responds of the study.

The variables considered were: age, gender, civil status, and ethnicity:

The Average age of the teacher-respondents is 17.89 years. Mostly are female (62.5%). Almost all (97.5%) are single. The bulk of the freshman college student are distributed to the four ethnic groupings, as follow: 20.8% are Yakans; 26.7% are Tausogs; 21.7% are Visayans; and 25.0% are Chavacanos.

Factors

Tables III to VIII show the means, descriptions, and ranks of the students' ratings on the extent to which certain factors affect the career preferences of freshman college students of Basilan State College, in terms of: Personal Factors; Family Factors; Social Factors; Economic Factors; School Factors; and job / Occupation Factors.

Factor 3 – Goal(s) in life / Ambition

Factor 10 – Knowledge and Skills that will be learned from the course

Factor 6 – Interest in the course

Factor 9- Attraction to the Uniform used by the course professionals

Factor 2 – Talent in the areas related and needed in the course

Factor 4 – Physical Capability required in the course

Factor 7 – Basic Skills possessed that are useful/needed in the course

Factor 8 – Emotional Attachment to the course

Factor 1 – Mental Capacity / Intelligence needed to tackle the course

Factor 5 – Status of Health required for the course



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Overall, the personal factors affect the career preference of freshman college students of Basilan State College to a moderate extent.

Practically all, except for one, the enumerated family factors affect the career preferences of freshmen college students of Basilan State College to the least extent. Factor 12 – 'Mother', affects the career preference of the students to a moderate extent.

The other family factors rated to affect the students' career preferences to the least extent were ranked as follows:

Overall, the family factors affect the career preferences of freshman college students of Basilan State College to the least extent.

It shows that the freshman college students are most affected by personal factors in their career preferences, followed by job/occupation factors. Social factors least affect the freshmen students in their career preferences.

But, as to the relative influence of socio-economic factors, it seemed that it does not strongly support the findings of some studies that were earlier conducted, where social and economic factors correlate to career decision making process.

Overall, the BSN Freshman students' preferences are most affected by family factors, which is to a great extent. On the other end, the BSCRIM Freshman students' preferences are least affected by family factors, which is to the least extent.

For the BSN Freshman Students, the top three (3) social factors affecting their career preferences. For the BSCS Freshman Students, the top three (3) social factors affecting the career preferences. For the BSCRIM Freshman Students, the top three (3) social factors affecting their career preferences. For the BEED/BSED Freshman Students, the top three (3) social factors affecting their career preferences.

Overall, the BSN Freshman students, preferences are most affected by social factors, and the BEED/BSED Freshman Students' preferences are least affected by social factors, but both are affected to the least extent only.

Overall, the BSN students' preferences were most affected school factors, but least affected by social factors. The BSCS students' preferences were affected by school factors, but least affected by family factors. The BSCRIM students' preferences

were most affected economic factors, but least affected by school factors. The BEED/BSED students' preferences were most affected by school factors, but least affected by social factors

In general, the BSN students' preferences were most affected by all factors, and the BSCRIM students' preferences were least affected by the enumerated factors.

IV. CONCLUSION

Personal, and jab/occupation factors, affect the career preferences of freshman college students of Basilan State College to the least extent.

The top ten (10) factors which affect the career preferences of freshman college students of Basilan State College are ranked as follows:

- Opportunity to and develop professionally grow (Job/Occupation)
- Goals(s) in life / Ambition (Personal)
- Interest and skills that will be learned from the course (Personal)
- Interest in the course (Personal)
- Can learn a lot more skills (job/occupation)
- Can develop my talent more (job/occupation)
- High paying Job / High Salary (Job/occupation)
- Can visit a lot of places / Travel (Job/occupation)
- Attraction to the uniform used by the course professional (Job/occupation)



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• Easier to land job abroad (Job/occupation)

The freshman college students are most affected by personal factors in their career preferences, followed by the job/occupation factors least affect the freshman students in their career preferences.

The BSN students' preferences were most affected by school factors, but least affected by social factors. The BSCS students' preferences were most affected by school factors, but least affected by family factors. The BSCRIM students' preferences were most affected by economic factors, but least affected by school factors. The BEED/BSED students' preferences were most affected by school factors, but least affected by social factors.

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
